

JUNE 2021 BLOCK OF THE MONTH

BUZZ SAW

2 different fabrics: One bold and one that's calm (not too busy).

You can use the bold as the buzz saw (center) and the calmer (not too busy) fabric as the background. Or you can switch them around and use the calmer (not too busy) fabric as the buzz saw (center) and the bold fabric as the background. You'll need to decide when cutting your fabric, which fabric will be used to create the buzz saw (center) because you'll need to cut 4 extra strips of this fabric to create the buzz saw (center).

Below are photos of how I used each of the fabrics to illustrate the bold fabric in the center in one block and the calm fabric in the center in the other.

Cutting your fabrics: 2 (buzz saw) @ $7 \frac{3}{8}$ " x $6 \frac{7}{8}$ "
4 (buzz saw) @ $1 \frac{5}{8}$ " x $6 \frac{1}{2}$ "
2 calm fabrics @ $7 \frac{3}{8}$ " x $6 \frac{7}{8}$ "



Note from Gladis:

I'm not sure if I covered this today during our zoom BOM demo:

When layering your fabric rectangles ($7 \frac{3}{8}$ " x $6 \frac{7}{8}$ ") to make the first diagonals cut, all the fabrics should be FACING UP. When sub-cutting the sewn rectangles into $1 \frac{5}{8}$ " strips, the fabrics should all be FACING UP and in the same position, i.e. diagonal seam going in same direction and like fabrics in same location (left or right or diagonals seam).
